FROM THE PRESIDENT

I am delighted to have been reelected as your State President. I and the other members of your State Executive are very aware of the trust that you have placed in us to administer the branch on your behalf, and we look forward to working closely with all members to further our aims. I thank all those who have offered themselves for election to positions across the state and thank those who are standing down.

I offer my congratulations to our latest State Life Members Maurie Benson, Bill Kane and Len Barlow: due recognition by your peers for loyal service to veterans, well done all. I am also delighted to welcome Peter Meehan as a Honourary State Life Member, again, recognition for his support of and service to the Victorian Vietnam Veteran community.

I can confirm that Victoria will host the 2012 VVAA National Congress in Geelong in May. Some preliminary work has already been done by VP Coghlan and the Geelong Sub-Branch, and your delegates to the 2011 national congress in NSW in May this year will present the proposed schedule for 2012 to the national delegates. Speaking of national, Victoria has already alerted the national council members to a range of issues that we will be pursuing. The issues are explained in more detail in the newsletter.

It seems that at every turn there are important issues potentially impacting veterans that we need to keep an eye on. National War Memorial funding, a new Minister for Veterans Affairs (along with his other portfolios), the Military Superannuation saga, MRCA review, change of State Government, funding pressures etc.

There is considerable discussion, opinion and misinformation flying about the airwaves in relation to revelations of goings-on at ADFA and within the Defence Forces and the proposed 2012 reconciliation activity in Vietnam. As I have noted in a personal opinion piece on the proposed reconciliation, an old saying goes "the truth is always surrounded by a bodyguard of lies" and there is much more to be learnt about both matters. Suffice to say that outcomes should be for the betterment of the ADF and veterans. and not for some politically motivated aim.

The matters of younger veterans joining the branch and future directions of the branch have been debated at length and a discussion paper on the latter topic prepared. Planning for the future is vital, and decisions taken that will impact on the branch in the future need to be carefully considered and debated, and in this I will be seeking input from the membership. There are clear stresses on our organisation which we need to recognise, acknowledge, confront and seek solutions for in order to ensure that we continue to look after each effectively into the future.

Against the background of all the goings-on, one thing stays constant; our need to remain focussed on delivering the best welfare support possible to our members. Welfare can take many forms, from formal intervention to assist veterans in crisis to a simple telephone call from a mate or a random act of kindness — often the most subtle gestures of support have a powerful effect. VICTORIA SEEKS ANSWERS ON OUTSTANDING ISSUES

Victorian issues again raised with VVAA National.

Government knowledge of the use of chemical agents in Vietnam, the potential risks associated with such use, and Government Denial of any link.

After much debate, the Victorian council has approved the following motions:

"That the Vietnam Veterans Association of Australia write to the Federal Government and demand acknowledgement that the government of the day knew of the impact of the use of chemicals on the health of Vietnam Veterans but refused to publicly acknowledge the link", and

"Demand that the Government acknowledge the struggle of the VVAA to have this link accepted and that the assertions made by the VVAA in relation to the impact on the exposure to chemicals on the health of veterans were correct".

It is Victoria's contention that the VVAA should make the strongest possible representations to government to have this matter addressed as detailed in the motions. To do otherwise is to break faith with those who gave so much to prove the link.

DVA Access to VVCS Files. It has been brought to our attention that DVA lawyers may be attempting to gain access to VVCS client files. One argument raised by DVA is that access to the files will facilitate progress on claims/VRB/AAT cases This issue has significant ramifications for veteran confidence in the impartiality and confidentiality of VVCS.

Support for National Vietnam Veterans Museum.

Victoria has introduced an increase of \$1 to annual capitations. Whilst acknowledging the donations that have been received from interstate sub-branches and ACT Branch, it is fair to say that consistent support from across the National membership has not been forthcoming. Victoria would hope that the National Council can resolve to provide more meaningful financial support in the future.

BEST Funding. Victoria would like to engage Council members in discussions on the funding ramifications contained in the report. BEST funding is important to us all, and Victoria is heavily reliant on adequate BEST funding for the Regional Veterans Centre Project. It is our contention that the BEST funding formula is flawed as it does not differentiate between simple client appointments and complex client matters which may take multiple appointments to address and thus use up more funds.

Civilian Nurses and Grave Plaques. Victoria wishes to be briefed on where we are at with the nurses in terms of when National made its last submission on the matter and what if anything is contemplated for the future. Similarly, we seek advice on what progress has been made on the matter of grave plaques for veterans KIA and who were buried under private arrangements.

Administrative Demands. Victoria is not enthusiastic about the level of detail and the level of presentation required by the National Secretary in relation to capitation returns and additional information sought by the secretary.

"Every family with any history will have some relative that has served in the forces, without question," Mr Bradley said. "They're really just destroying something that could be a memorial to one of their own family members at some point in time."

NVA/VC RECONCILIATION RUMOURS

RECONCILIATION WITH THE NVA/VC (OR HOW THE PRESS DON'T LET THE FACTS GET IN THE WAY OF A GOOD STORY)

Personal opinion by Bob Elworthy

There has been much made of a newspaper article that appeared in *The Australian* newspaper that suggested that "more than 2000 Australian Vietnam War veterans are expected to meet their former foes if an ambitious plan for a formal reconciliation......is agreed to by Hanoi".

The article further says: "If Hanoi agrees, the plan could result in Australian veterans joining a reconciliation parade with their former enemy, the North Vietnamese Army and the Viet Cong to coincide with next year's 50th anniversary of the start of Australia's decade-long involvement in the war".

Ever since the article appeared, the Veterans grapevine has been awash with rumours, comment and diverse opinion. I too was drawn into the discussion and tendered my own personal take on the issue. However, my comment was based in reaction to, and on an acceptance of the veracity of the newspaper article, and sadly on my part, too little time to reflect and too little time checking the facts. As a result, I have given the National RSL President an unwarranted whack. Since I aired my own opinions on the matter, I have been apprised of the background, intent and progress of the matter. So let's try to take most of the emotion-including my own-out of the issue and get to the REAL facts.

As far back as 1999, ESO's (including the VVAA at National level it seems) had written in support of the genesis of an idea to hold some form of (low key?) commemorative/reconciliatory activity in Vietnam in 2012, presumably to mark the 50th anniversary of our involvement there or perhaps the 50th anniversary of the raising of AATTV. There was never any suggestion of a march (or parade?) involving Australian Vietnam veterans; not back when the original idea was born, nor in any subsequent dealings by the RSL National President or others involved. The discussions with the Hanoi authorities are at a delicate stage, and I understand that at the time of writing there are no guarantees that Hanoi will sanction any form of activity, let alone agreeing to thousands of Australian Vietnam Veterans marching about the place.

So there you have it. The newspaper article draws a very long bow indeed, perhaps fuelled by excited (but misguided?) veterans and the need to create a headline. I am reminded of an old saying "The truth is always

surrounded by a bodyguard of lies" There are always two sides to every story. (Lesson to self – never believe what you read in the papers)

I still hold to my initial position; that is, I strongly believe that reconciliation is a personal matter for each Veteran to consider. To me, being comfortable within myself about my own time in Vietnam and in my own attitude towards former enemies, is sufficient. And I continue to ponder: exactly what is the motive behind pursuing a formal reconciliation, if in fact that is what is being contemplated? Is it politically motivated-if so to what end? Whatever the motivation, whatever the intent, I have not moved from my original stance that the major stakeholders in this-Vietnam Veterans and Vietnamese Veterans-need to be consulted, and should have a major say as to whether such action is warranted or even wanted.

And What of the Vietnamese Veterans?

Has the sensitivity of such a proposal in relation to the Vietnamese been thought through? I suspect that the Vietnamese have not been consulted properly about this proposal, although I understand that they may have been advised that something was afoot some years ago. Clearly, the Vietnamese Veterans have not been kept up to speed on developments, how else can the angst within the ranks of the Vietnamese Veterans Association in Victoria that has been expressed to me personally, be explained?

At a recent meeting to formally raise the Victorian Australian-Vietnamese Veterans Council, the Vietnamese Veterans-all Australian citizens by the way-were angry, upset and completely opposed to any notion of reconciliation. Fair enough too I suppose when you consider that many of them spent time in re-education camps (a pleasant sounding term for what were in reality not much better than slave labour and death camps) many of them still have family in Vietnam (and they will tell you that they live in fear and poverty) and they continue to send funds to Vietnam to assist disabled former ARVN soldiers who are left to fend for themselves in Vietnam.

Anecdotal evidence also suggests that former ARVN soldiers are permitted to undertake only menial work, and former South Vietnamese sympathisers and their families are heavily discriminated against by the communist regime.

Now I don't know about you, but I can't find it in me to engage in any type of formal reconciliation with former soldiers of a regime that deliberately violated a peace accord and today practices exactly the type of repression and abuse of human rights that we went to Vietnam to prevent in the first place.

VVAA Vic Education Team (ETeam)

All Organizations need a solid foundation, and for the Education Team it is the Office.

Our Office is the first point of contact for any presentation requests and it needs to be professional, informative and friendly, that's where our Office Manager Chris White comes in. Chris has been with the E Team from its' inception and is well informed on all aspects of the Team.

The Office Manager job description has many facets, taking bookings would be high on the list of priorities, explaining exactly what the E Team has to offer and talking to teachers and others, about their specific needs and what they want to be included in their presentation. Organizing the right team to do the presentation, making sure all details are correct, especially addresses, times and dates, parking and availability of aids needed for a smooth running presentation.

Chris likes to run a tight ship, she makes sure booking forms and booking schedules are up to date and set out regularly to all members to keep them informed as to what all our Teams are doing. A letter of Confirmation is also sent to the teachers.

Most of the donations come into the Office, they need to be receipted, documented and a letter of thanks has to be sent out. Also Petty Cash and some team member claims have to be colated and sent to the Treasurer for his action.

Another task that is the responsibility of the Office Manager is to make sure all Team members have uniforms, photo ID and Police and Working with Children checks.

Chris has to know all the team members' availability, there are a few "Grey Nomads" in the E Team, some take their holidays or are unavailable at any given time, that can take a bit of brain work to make sure all presentations are covered.

Reports have to be done for meetings, meetings have to be booked, requirements from State office need to be delegated and of course a Christmas letter to all recipients of a presentation during the year, with best wishes and an invitation for a return visit the following year, has to be sent.

For the Education Team our not so silent behind the scenes leader is Chris. The ETeam would be lost if it wasn't for our Office Manager Chris White.

CPL BENJAMIN ROBERTS SMITH VC MG

Australian Army

Awarded the Victoria Cross for Australia



Corporal Benjamin Roberts-Smith, VC, MG

Citation

For the most conspicuous gallantry in action in circumstances of extreme peril as Patrol Second-in-Command, Special Operations Task Group on Operation SLIPPER.

Corporal Benjamin Roberts Smith enlisted in the Australian Regular Army in 1996. After completing the requisite courses, he was posted the 3rd Battalion, the Royal Australian Regiment where he saw active service in East Timor. In January 2003, he successfully completed the Australian Special Air Service Regiment Selection Course.

During his tenure with the Regiment, he deployed on Operation VALIANT, SLATE, SLIPPER, CATALYST and SLIPPER II. Corporal Benjamin Roberts-Smith was awarded the Medal for Gallantry for his actions in Afghanistan in 2006.

On the 11th June 2010, a troop of the Special Operations Task Group conducted a helicopter assault into Tizak, Kandahar Province, in order to capture or kill a senior Taliban commander.

Immediately upon the helicopter insertion, the troop was engaged by machine gun and rocket propelled grenade fire from multiple, dominating positions. Two soldiers were wounded in action and the troop was pinned down by fires from three machine guns in an elevated fortified position to the south of the village. Under the cover of close air support, suppressive small arms and machine gun fire, Corporal Roberts Smith and his patrol manoeuvred to within 70 metres of the enemy position in order to neutralise the enemy machine gun positions and regain the initiative.

Upon commencement of the assault, the patrol drew

very heavy, intense, effective and sustained fire from the enemy position. Corporal Roberts Smith and his patrol members fought towards the enemy position until, at a range of 40 metres, the weight of fire prevented further movement forward. At this point, he identified the opportunity to exploit some cover provided by a small structure.

As he approached the structure, Corporal Roberts Smith identified an insurgent grenadier in the throes of engaging his patrol. Corporal Roberts Smith instinctively engaged the insurgent at point-blank range resulting in the death of the insurgent. With the members of his patrol still pinned down by the three enemy machine gun positions, he exposed his own position in order to draw fire away from his patrol, which enabled them to bring fire to bear against the enemy. His actions enabled his Patrol Commander to throw a grenade and silence one of the machine guns. Seizing the advantage, and demonstrating extreme devotion to duty and the most conspicuous gallantry, Corporal Roberts Smith, with a total disregard for his own safety, stormed the enemy position killing the two remaining machine gunners.

His act of valour enabled his patrol to break-in to the enemy position and to lift the weight of fire from the remainder of the troop who had been pinned down by the machine gun fire. On seizing the fortified gun position, Corporal Roberts Smith then took the initiative again and continued to assault enemy positions in depth during which he and another patrol member engaged and killed further enemy. His acts of selfless valour directly enabled his troop to go on and clear the village of Tizak of Taliban. This decisive engagement subsequently caused the remainder of the Taliban in Shah Wali Kot District to retreat from the area.

Corporal Roberts Smith's most conspicuous gallantry in a circumstance of extreme peril was instrumental to the seizure of the initiative and the success of the troop against a numerically superior enemy force. His valour was an inspiration to the soldiers with whom he fought alongside and is in keeping with the finest traditions of the Australian Army and the Australian Defence Force.

Vietnam Veterans Commemorative Walk Seymour Stage 1 Opened

Minister for Veterans' Affairs Hugh Delahunty officially opened Stage One of the new Vietnam Veterans' Commemorative Walk in Seymour on Wednesday 30 March. The completed first stage of the development includes a memorial cairn and a new interpretive centre called Luscombe Bowl.

Joining local Member for Seymour, Cindy McLeish, Mitchell Shire Mayor Graeme Coppell, President of the Victorian Branch of the RSL Maj Gen David McLachlan and Chairman of the Vietnam Veterans' Commemorative Walk Committee Ross Stewart at the facility, Mr Delahunty congratulated all involved for their work in developing the innovative commemoration project.

"The Coalition committed \$1.2 million during the 2010 election campaign towards the cost of completing Stage 2 of this wonderful development that will include a memorial wall and walk surrounded by rubber trees, rice paddies and military artefacts from the period. I look forward to celebrating the beginning of that next exciting stage."

Luscombe Bowl Interpretive Centre

You will need the following information:

Photocopy of the front page of your passport (one for each person if in a group) showing passport number, expiry date, date of birth etc. **Note**: Ensure all copies can be clearly read.

- * Date and time of visit.
- ★ Purpose of visit.

- ★ Mode of transport to the cemetery.
- ★ Passport size photo.

The information is required **45 days** in advance of the visit. **Note**: Notification of approval to visit the cemetery may take a few weeks.

VETERANS HOME MAINTENANCE LINE

The Veterans' Home Maintenance Line (VHML) is a toll free telephone service for members of the Veteran Community which:

Provides advice on general home maintenance matters;

Provides local referral to reliable and efficient trades people with appropriate qualifications, and both professional indemnity and public liability insurance cover:

Provides 24 hour access for emergency repairs;

Offers a home inspection service to identify current or possible future mainte nance problems and is available during weekdays in business hours; and

Provides links to Govern ment subsidised services where possible.

Who is eligible?

VHML is available to all members of the Veteran Community.

Who pays for the service?

The advice or referral for home maintenance is free, but you are required to pay for any work undertaken by the tradesperson, including any call out fee. You are also required to pay for the home inspection service.

Follow up

The VHML staff may contact you after the work has been completed to ask whether you are completely satisfied with the service that was arranged.

How to apply?

It's easy! Just ring 1800 80 1945 and ask for home maintenance advice or a referral to a tradesperson

Preventing Falls

Falls are not an inevitable part of ageing. Most falls can be prevented. One in three people aged 65 and over report falling at least once each year.

- * One quarter of these people sustain significant injuries and 5% sustain a fracture (usually humerus, wrist, hip or pelvis).
- * Strength and balance exercise has shown to reduce falls by older people.
- * Falls and accidents are a key factor in causing otherwise avoidable admissions to hospital.

HomeFront is a falls and accident prevention program available for all Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) gold and white card holders. A free HomeFront assessment is available each year and the department makes a financial contribution towards the cost of recommended items and modifications. HomeFront aims to maintain the health and independence of the veteran community and reduce potential medical and hospital costs by reducing the incidence of falls and accidents in and around the home.

Following the home assessment, DVA will make a financial contribution, currently \$203, towards the

cost of recommended aids and minor home modifications that will reduce the risk of falls and accidents. The recommended minor home modifications and/or aids and appliances are generally low cost items such as the provision of non slip treatment on steps or floors or extra lighting. The HomeFront assessor also provides information about local community and Government services that are available to assist veterans and war widows to remain living in their own home for as long as possible. A HomeFront assessment can be arranged by telephoning 1800 80 1945.

There are currently around 272 000 Australian veterans that are eligible for the HomeFront program.



GP's able to refer direct to Mental Health Practitioners

General practitioners can now refer holders of repatriation health cards who require mental health services to psychologists, clinical psychologists, mental health social workers and mental health occupational therapists. Under statutory registration introduced in November 2010, mental

health professionals registered with Medicare Australia are automatically able to provide allied mental health services to Department of Veteran Affairs (DVA) clients.

The DVA referral process for referring to these providers has not changed and a mental health treatment plan by the referring GP is not required.



Pneumonia can be a serious disease

Pneumonia is commonly caused by the pneumococcal bacteria.

The Australian Immunisation Guidelines recommend vaccination to the following groups, who are considered at high risk of infection from pneumococcal bacteria:

- Anyone over 65 years old
- People with heart, kidney and lung disease (eg. COPD)
- People with diabetes
- Anyone with a weakened immune system
- People of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander descent
- Tobacco smokers
- People without a spleen

The vaccine is FREE for anyone 65 years or older, on the National Pneumococcal Program for Older Australians.1

This residential course is designed for veterans and their partners. The program covers strategies to improve your lifestyle and to assist you to manage stress. It may include relaxation and stress management, practical advice on health, strategies to identify and manage anger, program solving and communication skills.

Take time out and spend some quality time together. A great opportunity to expand support and friendship networks.

Recommended for: Veterans, peacekeepers, eligible current serving

Depression and Anxiety

DEPRESSION: This program is available for veterans and their partners who have been diagnosed with depression and experience some anxiety symptoms. Topics include managing negative thinking, developing self-awareness, lowering physiological arousal and stress and maintaining motivation.

ANXIETY: Stress is a normal part of life but some people experience excessive worry, irritability, apprehension, restlessness, feel on edge or find that it impacts on their ability to get to sleep. This program will explore various relaxation methods and helps to develop more effective coping strategies.

NOTE: These programs may be combined into one at some locations.

Programs for Partners and Sons & Daughters

WCS offers programs designed specifically for veterans' partners and sons and daughters.

Partners' programs include:

A new era for veteran mental health management has arrived with the opening of the Coral-Balmoral Building at the Repatriation hospital Heidelberg: part of the Psychological Trauma Recovery Service at the Repat. The new facility replaces the post WWII wards 17 and 18 facility that had well and truly gone past its use by date.

The new \$15.5M building boasts modern in-patient facility, contemporary accommodation standards, including private rooms with ensuite, break out areas, modern kitchen, laundry and outdoor areas. The out-patient area is also state of the art, with excellent group therapy rooms and private consulting rooms. The long suffering staff have also been looked after with modern working spaces, and comfortable offices.

The old ward 17/18 facility will long be remembered kindly by those who were treated there and those who worked there. The new facility however is light years ahead of the old decrepit building it replaces. Significantly, it was the veteran community that brought the new facility to a reality through lobbying of the State Government for a new facility. The VPU is complimented by the adjacent Hydrotherapy and Rehabilitation Centre.

The VPU has become the major provider of specialist assessment and management of trauma related mental health conditions and takes a leadership role in the development and provision of community based mental health treatment services for veterans and their families.
