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FROM THE PRESIDENT



Welcome to this edition of FSB Vic, I hope you enjoy the contents. Maurie Benson is back as office manager and newsletter editor, replacing David Weekes who did a magnificent editorial job

last year. On the subject of the newsletter, the last 2012 edition was superb, and made all the better by the excellent input from the sub-branches.

After an extremely busy 2012, we are already off and running this year. Our AGM and first State Council for the year at Horsham out of the way, the Seymour Vietnam Veterans Commemorative Walk Project Phase II has been officially opened, what a great day. VetRide 2013 has been completed, amendments to our constitution are underway and the next iteration of our closure plan has been distributed.

Before moving on to what's on the horizon, I wish to pay special thanks to all of the volunteers across the state who worked so magnificently for the branch and in support of veterans. To those taking a well earned spell, a heartfelt thanks for your contribution to veteran welfare, to the newcomers, welcome aboard I am sure you will enjoy the camaraderie and get a kick out of watching your efforts benefit veterans. And to the stalwarts going around again, you are the salt of the earth and your blood worth bottling-but not immediately after a session at Melton, Noble Park or the DViets! I am delighted on your behalf to welcome Ken Baker to your executive; Ken brings a wealth of knowledge and will be a great asset to the executive team.

It has been interesting to watch the gyrations of the politicians, even at this early stage of the nonelection campaign. There seems to be much more movement in the state than we have been accustomed to for some time, and I am sure that we will see more visits, and more interest in us as an association as the election draws near; funny that. Perhaps an early pointer is the complete about face by the Australian War Memorial Council in relation to the placing of the peacekeeper names on the honour rolls at the AWM. Do you reckon there was any political pressure? What it says to me is that we will likely be an important lobby group again as the political scene hots up, and we need to be prepared to lobby as hard as we can for the values we hold dear and protect with all our might the conditions we currently have. As one prominent politician recently said to me "they won't believe me unless it is tattooed on my bum", well I can recommend some good tattooists!

As you will know, I keep banging on about grass roots welfare; because I am of the opinion that if you strip back all the other stuff we do across the branch, the only really worthwhile endeavour is that of helping out our fellow veterans. Recently Sue McQueen and I, with support from Swan Hill sub-branch and local RSL sub-branches, buried a Vietnam veteran in Kerang. Unfortunately he had been dead in his house for some time before being found and then his remains lay in the Bendigo morgue for nearly three weeks before we were alerted.

Thanks to Sue's the great work, we managed to get his ex wife and a scattered and fractured family together and the service went off with the sort of dignity and farewell a veteran deserves-he was headed for a pauper's grave. Please reflect on that sad end, let's all redouble our efforts to make sure we know where our members are and how they are travelling. Maybe it's time also to renew acquaintances with the local hospital, police, Salvo's and other community agencies and remind them to seek us out if they come in contact with a veteran-of any era. They are out there and they need our help. If we needed any more convincing that there are veterans out there who need our help, then we need only to refer to the shocking newspaper revelations of suicide within the younger veteran cohort and the shortcomings of the "system".

The existence of our closure plan paper has drawn interesting comment from some of the other states, to which I have responded. Rather than being seen as a negative approach as described by others, I like to think that the plan is in fact positive and sensible planning for the future. Rather than sit back and look through rose coloured glasses and expect sons and daughters and younger vets to keep the association going after we have gone, I prefer that we get on the front foot and plan our eventual decline in the way that we want. Experience tells me that our children and younger vets are not join-

ers, and they do not want to be involved with the running of the branch to any great capacity Further, there is clear evidence that as our veteran members age, their minds turn to their own health and well being at the expense of the broader activities of the branch, and as they leave the branch for whatever reason, that their partner and/or children leave also.

There is a glimmer of hope for the civilian nurses. Recent revelations in the press and some work done at national have given rise to renewed hope that a claim submitted to DVA might have a chance if it can be proven that the nurses responded to Australian military requests; there is also a chance that responding to ARVN requests could also be accepted. Noble Park and Box Hill sub-branches have taken renewed interest and attempting to work up a test case with the nurses-fingers crossed!

In collaboration with the education team, two bursaries for Vietnamese students are to be created and awarded for the first time this year. I believe that this is an excellent initiative, one that will not cost a lot of money but is likely to be very well received by the Vietnamese community and further cement our good relations. This is possible because of the financial health of our education welfare account which was swelled by a \$7000 cheque from the E Team, being the proceeds of donations from schools.

I am excited at the decision of the state council to support a car in this year's Variety Bash for Kids in August. A levy of \$25 per sub-branch, to be matched by state will be initially donated, and I have already put the screws on the national council to match our effort-the response has been pretty good. The car will bear the VVAA logo and carry a VVAA flag, and in so doing provide us with some good PR. The car will be available for PR efforts with local sub-branches along the way. The bash begins in Melbourne and ends in Broome after going across the top end.

There has been advice from our representative at the DVA Victoria Deputy Commissioner's Forum that ward 17 in the Coral/Balmoral facility at Heidelberg is full and overflow patients are being sent to other hospitals at DVA expense. Additionally, it seems that there is a waiting list. Your executive is asking questions of DVA in relation to how many beds DVA funds in ward 17 for veterans, and

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whether in fact these beds are being occupied by veterans or others-I understand that the ward takes ambos', police, firies and public servants. This is a disturbing trend and we are seeking assurances that veterans have priority access to the DVA funded beds and that everything is being done to support ill veterans. Just a reminder for members that Coral/Balmoral is run by Austin Health, there is no emergency admission facility there, and all patients need a referral from a doctor.

We have spoken often about the need to ensure that our members are medicating themselves correctly, and there is an article in this newsletter addressing that very subject-I commend it to all of you. We have received advice that prescriptions or medicines provided for Veterans are finding their way onto the black market, and I ask that all subbranches raise this important matter with their members. All members should be aware that DVA has visibility of all prescriptions provided to veterans.

I have noted on a number of occasions the funding problems being experienced by the Regional Veteran Centre Project, funding problems that are not likely to get better, at least in the short term. To further exacerbate the problem this year, at the time of writing, the issue of the BEST funding guidelines has been delayed, the provision of BEST funding application forms has been delayed, there is as yet no indication of the funding level and no indication of the statistics required to be returned. The questions have to be asked: is this really the way to do business? Is this really the way to treat a largely volunteer workforce that saves the Government literally millions of dollars?

I thank and congratulate the state council and in particular the sub-branches who took the lead in discussions relating to the conduct of Vietnam Veterans Day leading up to 2016. The generous offer to subsidise the provision of refreshments at the Shrine is gratefully accepted and will ensure that attendees can get a brew, something to eat and have a good chin wag before the ceremony.

You will notice some major changes to our website this year as the site is completely overhauled and updated, the result should be very exciting and provide much easier access to all of the features. I acknowledge and thank Len Barlow for his continued

work on our behalf as website manager. By the way, anyone out there interested in understudying Len, give the secretary a call.

I wish to note the excellent work of David Weekes in his time on your executive. All of the executive thank you for your support over the past year and look forward to another successful year.

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- Insurance matters pertaining to Pension/ Welfare Officers.

- Vietnam Veterans Day. Sub Branches to discuss sponsorship for VV Day at the Melbourne Shrine. For discussion at next SCM.
- Under our Control. Sub Branches to review and develop their own plans. For discussion at next SCM.
- State Constitution. Review document and respond to State Sec.
- DVA Communication with Clients. DVA is to establish a system whereby they will contact a client once a claim has been submitted without 1st contacting the Pension Officer. State Council believes this is disadvantageous to the client. Editor comment:

State Council Members and VVAA Members are of the opinion that this move is not in the best interest of the client who, in a complex and stressful claim process, is relying on the Pension Officer to act as his/her "Advocate". The Pension Officer is trained to manage the process, understands what DVA requires and can answer questions in a far more precise and meaningful manner than the client.

Education Bursaries.
A William Hacking Bursary is available.
Interested applicants should contact the State Secretary; conditions apply.
State Council has agreed to a request for an Education Grant to a Vietnamese student.

MEN'S PEER HEALTH

Introducing Gary Treeve and his important role in developing DVA's Men's Health Peer Education program in Victoria:

Firstly a little bit about myself. I was called-up for National Service in 1967, but at the time I had just commenced my 4th year of a five year indentured apprenticeship in boilermaker welder and was granted a two year deferment. I thought the Army would forget me after two years - how wrong I was! I started my National Service at the 3rd Training Battalion Singleton NSW, after 10 weeks training I was posted to 1 Company RAASC Ingleburn. Later Corps transferred to RAEME to continue my trade.



I was posted to RMC Workshop Platoon in Canberra. During this posting I meet and married my wife Midori, three weeks later I was in Vietnam 71-72. I extended my National Service by one year to go to Vietnam. While serving in Vietnam I joined the Regular Army where my career spanned for 20 years and retired as a Warrant Officer Class One (WO1). During this time I was posted to:

- 3 Base Workshop Battalion,
- Puckapunyal Workshop Company
- 5 Base Workshop Battalion, Aviation Oakey
- Army Apprentices School Balcombe
- Armament Wing RAEME Training Centre Bandiana, and finally
- Maintenance Engineering Agency (MEA) in St Kilda Road Melbourne.

After leaving the Army I worked at Wodonga Tafe for 11 years teaching engineering, welding construction and as an Industry Training Consultant in OH&S.

In January 2000 due to medical reasons I was forced into early retirement.

In that year, the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) were looking for volunteers to join the Men's Health Peer Education program (MHPE).

The MHPE program aims to raise awareness about men's health issues by encouraging members of the veteran and ex-service community to share the responsibility for managing their own health and wellbeing. The program trains volunteers from all age groups to provide health information to members of the veteran and ex-service communities. After attending a training course run by DVA for volunteers I agree to share this health information with others. This can be done via many channels: for example, giving a talk on a health issue at a local community group or exservice organisation meeting; setting up or working with 'Men's Sheds', running a stand at a community expo' or personally chatting to a person, such as a mate at a barbecue.

The range of ways to spread the word on men's health is quite diverse. How volunteer choose to do this is up to their own personal style and what they feel most comfortable doing.

It is also up to volunteers to decide on their own time commitment. Some may predominantly 'work' one day or night per week, while others may opt to 'work' when events come up (for example, setting up a stall at an air-show and manning it for the whole weekend).

I attended the first ever MHPE training in 2000. I am the Regional Representative for Victoria since December 2012. I have previously been the state Volunteer representative. I am also the only active MHPE volunteer who has done over 10 years MHPE service!

I personally have benefitted from being a MHPE volunteer as it has been good therapy for me. I feel the ongoing information provided about health topics, enables me to reach out to veterans and veteran communities by making them aware of the benefits to health and thinking about your health. My training background enables me to give presentations to lots of different groups about men's health. My simple message is go to your doctor and get checked!

One example of this was a presentation I delivered about lifestyle and type 2 diabetes. A veteran in the audience heard the information which prompted him to seek medical advice. This veteran then approached me to tell me that as a result of this check-up, his sugar reading was high and needed to commence treatment and diabetes education. I gain tremendous satisfaction knowing I am making a real difference to help veterans look after their health better.

New pension and income support payments rates for veterans, their partners, war widows and widowers across Australia come into effect from today, 20 March 2013.

The Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Warren Snowdon, announced the increase is part of the bi-annual indexation process. Veterans, partners, war widows and widowers will also receive a boost to their payments through the Clean Energy Supplement, a regular payment under the Household Assistance Package to help meet household costs associated with the carbon price.

The first payday which will include payments under the new rates will be 4 April 2013.

FITTING END FOR VETERAN.

In late January VVAA Vic executive received word of a Vietnam Veteran, David William Bachelor, who had apparently been deceased in Bendigo for 3 weeks with no-one to bury him.

After some short discussion it was decided that this Vietnam Veteran would be given a fitting and dignified funeral.

It transpired David had passed away at home in Mincha, Central Victoria on 6th January with no known next of kin and it took several weeks for the Coroner to locate one. Consequently David was cremated without a service or any family present.

Liaison with authorities, Ex Service Organisations, and his estranged family resulted in David being laid to rest in Kerang where his parents are buried, with the dignity befitting a Vietnam Veteran on 27th February 2013.

A Memorial service was conducted by President Bob Elworthy, ably assisted by Asst Secretary Sue McQueen in the presence of about 50 people including some family members, members of Bendigo & Swan Hill VVAA, Kerang & Pyramid Hill RSL's and some of David's neighbours.

The Memorial Service, Niche, plaque and associated costs were covered by VVAA Vic with the assistance of the above mentioned ESO's. 'Grass Roots Welfare at work'.

This matter should serve as a timely reminder to all Vets to get their affairs in order, now.



Saturday 9th March 2013

Under a blazing sun at Seymour Victoria a large crowd of several thousand people gathered for the opening of the 2nd Stage of the Vietnam Veterans' Commemorative Walk.

The Commemorative Walk is not to memorialise those who served in Vietnam and/or those who paid the ultimate price, but to commemorate the service of all who played their part in what turned out to be a

tumultuous part of Australia's history. It does, in the interpretive centre, give an accurate history of the times prior to military commitment, the period of our involvement and the aftermath.



The Walk is a meandering red earth path set in native trees (400 Spotted Gums) and grasses that resemble rubber trees and rice paddies. These two plants are synonymous with Vietnam. Along the length of this Walk are walls made up of panels of DigiGlass with the name of every Serviceman and Servicewoman who served in their various capacities. The names are separated only by the Service in which they served in alphabetical order. The plinths on which the panels stand have holes for Poppies; the effect is to have a



field of Poppies under the names. Behind the names is the picture story of the Vietnam conflict. There will be areas of contemplation for people to use along the length of this walk and Military artefacts of the period, an Iroquois Helicopter, M2A2 howitzers, M113 APC's and a Centurion Tank.

The Long Tan Cross, constructed by Cpl Barry





UBON VETERANS FINALLY RECOGNISED

Parliamentary Secretary for Defence - Justice: Ubon Veterans finally recognised.

21 February 2013

Members of the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) who were posted to Thailand's Ubon Air Base between 25 June 1965 and 31 August 1968 are now finally eligible for the Vietnam Logistic and Support Medal.

Parliamentary Secretary for Defence Senator David Feeney, said it was an honour to right such a wrong.

"These are veterans who have served their nation with pride, who put themselves into harm's way for the good of Australia. I am proud to have implemented this change and to see that these veterans are finally recognised for their efforts toward the Vietnam War."

The matter as to whether to award the VLSM to RAAF members at Ubon was referred to the Defence Honours and Awards Appeals Tribunal. The Tribunal found that RAAF personnel who served at Ubon should be awarded the VLSM.

Senator Feeney has accepted this finding on behalf of the Australian Government.

Head of the RAAF Ubon Recognition Group, Mr Mal Barnes, said it was a decision they have waited over 45 years for.

"We always knew this was a medal we deserved, a medal we had earned. This is something we should never have had to campaign for, but we did. It is a relief for all RAAF veterans who were at Ubon to finally be recognised for their service. This is something the Coalition had the power to fix and never did," Mr Barnes said.

Ubon is a Royal Thai Air Force base in South Eastern Thailand. From 1965, the United States Air Force (USAF) started using Ubon in support of Thailand, and later as a base to attack North Vietnam. RAAF No 79 Squadron remained at Ubon to provide a joint presence to confront the spread of communism in South East Asia.

From March 1965, USAF increased its bombing of North Vietnamese targets, with Ubon being one of the bases used. As a result, Ubon became a significant target for retaliatory raids. On 25 June 1965, RAAF No 79 Squadron commenced the highest sustainable armed air defence alert. This applied dawn to dusk, seven days per week. Two Sabre jets remained armed and ready for takeoff with five minutes notice. Guards were also sent to protect the base from ground attack. They patrolled 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

"There is no doubt in my mind that these were warlike conditions. There was a very real risk, as demonstrated by the protection measures undertaken. This is a squadron that made a very significant difference to the campaign directed against North Vietnam and the protection of a base on behalf of the USAF.

"Awarding the VLSM will show for once and for all that these veterans gave essential and direct logistic support to Australian forces in Vietnam," Senator Feeney said.

Royal Australian Air Force members who believe they may now be entitled to the Vietnam Logistic and Support Medal, are invited to make application to the Directorate of Honours and Awards. Eligible next-of-kin may apply on behalf of deceased former members. Application forms can be obtained from www.defence.gov.au/medals/ or by calling the Directorate of Honours and Awards, toll free, on 1800 111 321 The medal may not be awarded to a member who is eligible for the Vietnam Medal.

Members who have already submitted an application are not required to re-apply.





DOG TAG MEMORIAL CHICAGO

When visitors first enter the Museum they will hear a sound like wind chimes coming from above them and their



attention will be drawn upward 24 feet to the ceiling of the two-story high atrium.

Dog tags of the more than 58,000 Service men and women who died in the Vietnam War hang from the ceiling of the National Vietnam Veterans Art Museum in Chicago on Veterans Day, November 11, 2010. The 10-by-40-foot sculpture, entitled *Above & Beyond*, was designed by Ned Broderick and Richard Steinbock. The tens of thousands of metal dog tags are suspended 24 feet in the air, 1 inch apart, from fine lines that allow them to move and chime with shifting air currents. Museum employees using a ki-

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osk and laser pointer help visitors locate the exact dog tag with the imprinted name of their lost friend or relative.

NEW MENTAL HEALTH APP FOR VETERANS AND ADF MEMBERS

A new smart phone application helping current and former serving members of the Australian Defence Force to identify and manage mental health symptoms was launched today by the Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Warren Snowdon.

Demonstrating the app to troops at Robertson Barracks in Darwin, Mr Snowdon said that *PTSD Coach Australia* was developed to help veterans identify the signs of Posttraumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and encourage them to seek help.

"A priority for this government is ensuring that a range of mental health services and support are available for veterans of all ages—young and old—and that these services are tailored to their needs and the needs of their families," Mr Snowdon said.

"PTSD Coach Australia provides them with education about PTSD, information about self assessment and professional care, and tools to manage the stresses of daily life with PTSD."

Based on an app first developed in 2011 for US veterans, *PTSD Coach Australia* comprises tools for relaxation, positive self-talk, anger management and a scheduler to help users manage their self care, health appointments and other activities.

Mr Snowdon said *PTSD Coach Australia* was not designed as a stand-alone treatment or self diagnosis, but as part of a toolkit to assist people in managing PTSD.

"This app doesn't replace clinical assessment and treatment by a qualified mental health clinician. A Clinicians Guide on integrating *PTSD Coach Australia* into treatment is available on DVA's At-Ease website," he said.

PTSD Coach Australia was developed by the Australian Centre for Posttraumatic Health for the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) and the Australian Defence Force (ADF) and is available for Apple and Android devices. To download the app visit the App Store, Google Play or the At-Ease website www.at-ease.dva.gov.au.

For professional, interpersonal care, the Veterans and Veterans Families Counselling Service (VVCS) provides counselling and group programs to veterans, peacekeepers and eligible family members. It is a specialised, free and confidential Australia-wide service and may be contacted 24 hours a day on freecall **1800 011 046**.




