Honour the dead but fight like hell for the living



Hey, where did 2018 go? So here I am now racing towards the big 70!

To all you vets out there who have already hit the big 70 and beyond, well done you “old codgers”! And to all of you over 70’s who are DFRDB pension recipients (you know, the pension that keeps on giving – to the Government!), I bring special greetings from the Commonwealth Super Board; may you continue to enjoy

good health and continue to make your involuntary contributions for many years to come.

On a serious note, the DFRDB scandal continues to land on tin ears in Government, and I thank all who took the time to sign the on line petition. The treatment of DFRDB recipients who decided to commute part of their pension to a lump sum is nothing short of a disgrace (the banks have nothing on the Commonwealth Super Board when it comes to ripping clients off), and is just another way that many Vietnam veterans and other ex-service personnel continue to be screwed.

WE DID IT, WE DID IT, WE DID IT!

We got the Gold Card for the SEATO medical and surgical teams! On Friday 14 December I joined Dot Angell and two other SEATO nurses for a meeting with Darren Chester the Minister for Veterans Affairs and Josh Frydenberg the Federal Treasurer at the Shrine of Remembrance where the Minister advised us that the Government will make the DVA Gold Card available to the surviving members of the SEATO teams. We were prevented from making any comment until the news hit the papers on Sunday.

I reported to you that we had finally destroyed the Government’s argument against providing the Gold Card to the SEATO folk in September this year. I provided the Minister with evidence that civilian members of the Defence Signals Directorate went to Vietnam on Diplomatic passports, were attached to the Australian Embassy in Saigon as liaison officers and had successfully had their claims for a DVA Gold Card accepted, and also that the Government had now made provision for the Gold Card to be provided to civilians who may have been impacted by the British Nuclear Testing in Australia.

We got the Gold Card for the SEATO medical and surgical teams!

Before moving on to quick review of other key achievements for 2018, I want to reflect for a moment or two on the loyal and brave Vietnam veteran mates who have passed away this year. I have attended too many funerals for my liking this year, but unfortunately it seems to be a sign of the times, and there is no doubt in my mind that Vietnam War service impacted their health and contributed to their far too early demise. Happily, the funerals were a celebration of life and faithful service and I dip my lid to all of our mates who have passed. Well Done Those Men (with apologies to Barry Heard for using the title of his terrific book), we will remember them.

We hit a number of high points in 2018. In no particular order:

*Bob Glaubitz managed a big smile when we finally acquitted the \$1M state Government grant for the 2016 commemorations. We were delighted to be able to submit an unqualified audit report to the Department of Premier and Cabinet – well done Bob.

*Another excellent commemorative event at the Shrine, with the focus on Coral/Balmoral. The feedback indicated that many who attended thought it our best commemorations ever. Well done Maurie Benson and all involved, thanks to the Shrine Governors for allowing us to use audio/visuals and present a “Vietnam Veteran” type of service. Thanks also to all who contributed to help finance the Gunfire Breakfast.

*Branch membership cracked 2000. A wonderful effort when it is considered that many members passed away, and

some have not renewed membership. This was offset in part by a steady trickle of new members and others returning to the fold. Well done to all, and in particular Sue and Lindsay who keep the best membership register in the VVAA, and to those Sub-Branches who equaled or surpassed their 2017 membership totals.

*Amended our constitution to give SEATO team members ordinary member status.

*Success with obtaining grants through the Victorian Veterans Council for VV Day 2018, E Team activities, and Branch Executive functions.

*Final presentation of Branch awards at the last Story Writing and Arts Competition. We have been proud sponsors of this annual competition for a number of years. Thanks to

Aff Binnoore for being our SWAC representative.

*Progressing our closure plan from a discussion paper to a guide for closure with the inclusion of detail on the role of the State Executive. The experience of some of our sub-branches closing has increased our confidence in the content of the closure paper. Our closure plan has now been extended to the VVAA National Executive and copies forwarded to the Victorian Veterans Council, Department of Premier and Cabinet Veterans Branch and Legacy Victoria.

*Maintaining a strong presence at the National Congress and Council meetings. The Branch continues to advocate for a lessening of the administrative burden imposed by national on the branches, and more recently, the branch pushed for a distribution of national funds to the National Vietnam Veterans Museum.

*Two members recognized in the Queen's Birthday honours list.

*State Council commitment to VV Day commemorations at the Shrine for 2019, where the Battle of Binh Ba and other actions from 1969 will take centre stage.

*Recording of reflections of Coral/Balmoral veterans, one of whom has since passed on. It is critical that we record such memoirs while there is still time.

*The annual Leslie Farren Memorial award was presented to Jeff Freeman in recognition of his work at the Repat.

*Continuation of the Branch "Dollar Day" donation to the NVVM, taken from your capitations.

The Branch Executive continues to have an excellent working relationship with the RSL folk at ANZAC House and I have written to Dr. Rob Webster on behalf of the Branch to thank him and his staff for their on-going support. Occupying an office in ANZAC House is of tremendous benefit to the Branch.

Similarly, we continue to enjoy good working relationships with the Department of Premier and Cabinet Veterans Branch and Consumer Affairs Victoria. The executive hosted a small morning tea at ANZAC House recently to thank the members of the Veterans Branch for their support, particularly during our 2016 commemorative year.

After the recent state election, John Eren, the former State Minister for Veterans has stood down from ministerial responsibilities. I look forward to working with the new Minister to advance the lot of our members.

Your education team continues to represent the Branch magnificently and it is planned to deploy the E Team to

Echuca/Moama a few days before our 2019 AGM to conduct a community awareness and education program.

Another year of achievement and camaraderie draws to an end. At this time of the year our thoughts and deeds are focused on family and loved ones—rightly so, for they are veterans in their own right. It is worth pausing just for a moment to recognize that this time of the year may not be a happy one for some of our members and partners who may be alone for the first time, have just lost a loved one, may be estranged, or in poor health.

As your personal Christmas gift to them, can I encourage you to take a moment or two to give a mate or two a quick call just to say "hello, I am thinking of you". You may never know how powerful and meaningful those simple words might be. And isn't grass roots welfare what we pride ourselves on?

To each and every one, Lyn and I wish you all a peaceful and Holy Christmas and a restful and happy New Year. We are privileged to be able to call ourselves one of you. BRING ON 2019!

YOUR SUB BRANCH NEEDS YOU

'Last Friday [14 Dec] I met with Dot Angell, a couple of other SEATO nurses, the Federal Treasurer Josh Frydenberg, and the Minister for Veterans Affairs Darren Chester at the Shrine of Remembrance where it was announced that the SEATO team members would finally get the Gold Card.

Members will recall that about a year ago it was decided to give up on trying to get DVA pensions for the SEATO teams, the government was just not going to budge. So it was Gold Card or bust.

I mentioned some months ago that I had attended a very promising meeting with the Minister for Veterans Affairs where he was presented with new, and what I believed to be compelling evidence, that other civilians during the Vietnam War had successfully applied to the government for the Gold Card. Coupled with the government announcement that civilians who may have been impacted by the British nuclear testing were also now eligible for the Gold Card, it was put to the Minister that the Government could no longer deny the SEATO members because we had defeated their two main arguments, i.e. The SEATO members were civilian and not attached to the ADF.

I congratulate the government for this long overdue recognition of the SEATO team members who now number less than 200. This brings to an end a decades long fight with federal governments of both political persuasions to achieve what I believe to have been one of our last big pieces of unfinished business, and another achievement for the VVAA of which we can be very proud. Thank you to all who persisted along the way, once again we have lived our motto by Honouring the SEATO team members we have passed on and we Fought Like Hell for those still with us.'

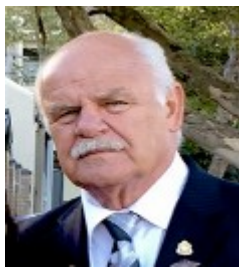

We should all be very proud of our achievements this year, I know I am. 2018 has been a very productive and successful year for us all. Membership has remained steady and falls just short of last years total but still over our magic number of 2000, be it by

just one. This year (*to date*) we have lost 31 of our mates and our thoughts go out to their family & friends. They will be sadly missed. 'Lest we Forget'

The events for this year were many and varied with Sub-Branches working hard to deliver services to their members within their own communities and Sub-Branch. The Sausage sizzles, Day outings, Wives activities Coffee mornings, Badge Week and other Welfare fundraisers and let's not forget the Sub-Branch's local Vietnam Veterans Day commemorations all make for a happy veteran community. Vietnam Veterans Day at the Shrine this year surpassed all expectations. The theme was the Battle of Coral/Balmoral with Eltham College Band performing amongst other songs '*He was only Nineteen.*' The Mentone Grammar School cadets (26) were the flag bearers and guard of honor on the day.

Commemorations this year were a little different from previous years in that, there was no keynote speaker on the day, this instead was replaced with a *Retrospective* to those who died during the battles of Coral and Balmoral.

The addition this year of a television screen displaying a live broadcast of the commemorations added to the atmosphere. The broadcast switched between recollections by veterans of their experiences in Vietnam and live broadcasts of activities around the Shrine precinct. Truly well done and greatly appreciated by all attending.

Comments after the event came in from all over Australia validating the hard work put in by the organizing committee and the effort by Sub-Branches in getting their members to the Shrine for the occasion. Most comments were around how well we do it here in Victoria. It was a truly spectacular day.

Planning is already underway for next year 2019.

We are truly blessed here in Victoria at being able to work hand in hand with a Government who actively supports Veteran Welfare by showing a genuine interest in keeping the veterans cause alive. A pre-election promise to fund VVAA Victoria to the tune of \$1m in support of our members gives us certainty in hosting the Vietnam Veterans Day Commemorations for 2019.

The museum from humble beginnings has grown into a Nationally recognized tourist destination winning certifica-

tion from Trip Advisor, ACNC and many more. The Museum is in dialog with a number of local land owners in regard to the procuring of land for their new home and future expansion. The museum is very close to achieving full museum status.

Military equipment continues to come in, the latest a Sabre Jet, a C130 aircraft have been gifted to the Museum with the hunt on now for a F4 Phantom for adding to the list. These new additions will join the Caribou recently fitted out as a classroom where visiting schools and children can experience, through an interactive visual display, a realistic feeling of what it was like on a day way back when all those years ago. The simulated take offs and landings will add to their experience as will the opportunity to sit in the pilot seat, play with the instruments and controls and experience boarding and disembarking by way of the hydraulic movable ramp.

As part of the Governments pre election promise in November a further \$200.000 has been allocated to allow more students to learn about the Vietnam conflict the 60,000 that went and the 521 who never made it home.

The museum is constantly evolving with continuous rotations of the Displays and Events. Donations from Veterans, families of Veterans and the general public come in frequently, these are put into storage until the opportunity for a specific display comes around. The future of our Museum is looking really bright thanks to the talented Board of Directors and the Museum management team.



I have over the last few months started to accept invitations to Commemorative events around Melbourne. Just recently I attended the Remembrance Day commemorations at Woodlea, deputizing for Bob Elworthy.

The service was well attended by Vietnam Veterans and veterans from other conflicts and the general public. At completion of the service I took some time out and look around their Memorial Walk which was very impressive. On the way home I detoured by way of Wheelahan Park Memorial at Sunshine. The Memorial was erected to honor Australia's commitment in Vietnam and to remember the 521 who died there. Earlier this year it was vandalized with many marble panels damaged and broken. I am pleased to report the damage has all been repaired and the site is once again good as new. A 1st Anniversary Commemoration has been planned for this year and I look forward to attending once again.

As mentioned, 2018 has been a very productive year for VVAA Victoria. Thank you to my fellow Committee members for their support and to the Sub-Branches Executives

for their dedication and effort in keeping membership numbers up and the Sub-Branches running smoothly. Your co-operation certainly makes my job easier.

CENTRE STATE PRINTING

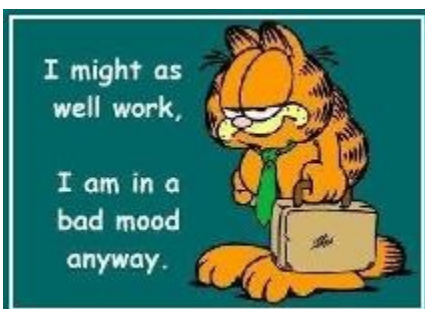

SUPPORTING THE MEN AND WOMEN WHO PROTECT US

Every single day, there are men and women who put their lives on the line for us. A re-elected Andrews Labor Government will make sure that service is given the respect and recognition it deserves.

Today's announcement builds on Labor's commitment to introduce provisional acceptance payments for mental health injuries for emergency workers, making sure that these dedicated Victorians can access mental health support the moment they need it.

Ensuring veterans have the support they need as they transition back into civilian life, Labor will provide \$1 million to Veterans in Construction to secure work for 100 veterans across our major projects and other private sector jobs.

This new investment is in addition to the Victorian veterans who are already contributing to the Andrews Labor Govern-

ment's massive infrastructure program, removing level crossings and building road and rail across our state.

Today's announcement recognises that the skills and experience veterans gain in the ADF are second-to-none, and ensures these Victorians can continue their service to our state.

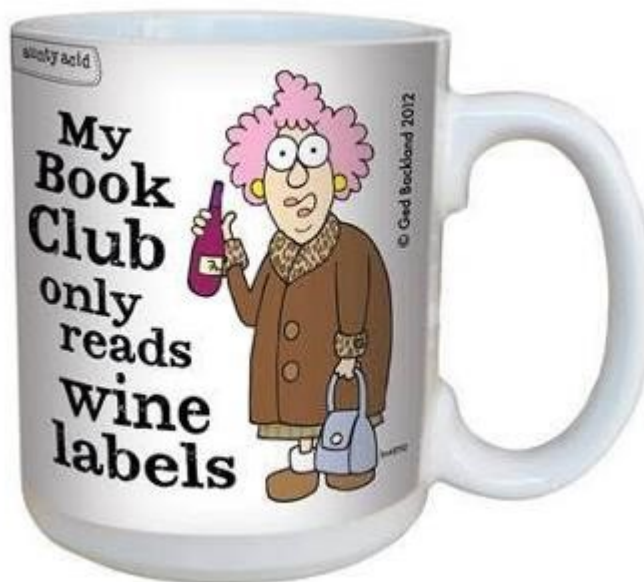

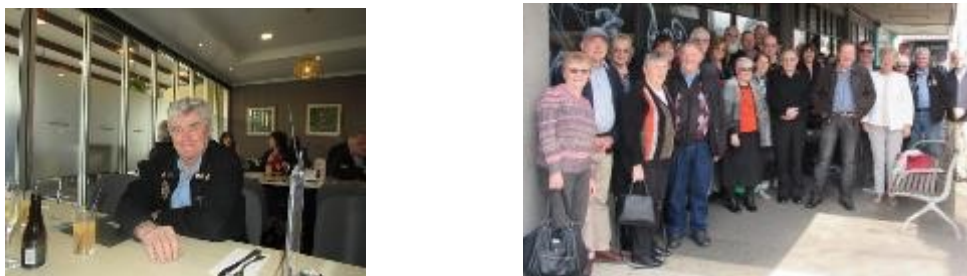

Our Young Vet Friend Rye.

Watching Telly one night early in the year an ad came over conveying the message that the INVICTUS GAMES were coming to Sydney. I didn't think much of it at the time but seeing the ad a few more times spiked my interest. I had always thought these games to be a Pommy thing that Prince H instigated.

Hence, I looked into it further to find that it was like a mini Olympics Prince H helped set up to support troubled vets from all around the world and yes this circus was coming to Sydney.



Being a Vet myself and part of our local VVAA group, we were always looking for ideas to engage with the younger vets in the area. I thought this could be such an opportunity. My first thought was maybe to take a motion to the club that we could donate some money to the games organisation to help it along. However, one look at the extent of the games coverage, I thought our offering would be lost in such a big pot, so lost interest in that approach.

Time went by. Then in about June the Australian team of the Games was announced. Ha! I thought maybe we could help a team member to get to the games. Checking out the web site of the Australian

Team I happened upon a lad, Rye Shawcroft, in our area only a few k's from our RSL.

Hence, at our next club meeting I spoke to the members seeking their support that if I was to approach Rye, we as a club would be willing to support him any way we could to get him to the games. The club was 100% unanimous.

With that backing I contacted Rye and invited him to the RSL for a meeting with club president Kelvin and myself. At this meeting we found Rye to be a determined 22 year old who had joined the Army in

2014 to be discharged 2 years later after experiencing neural pathway, circulation and musculoskeletal problems with his knees and hips. Rye after being unsuccessful in his bid to compete in the 2017 games was ecstatic to be invited to attend the 2018 training camp and to make the team.

Asking Rye how we could help him get to the games, (thinking he would probably be ok with a few bob and some training gear) he requested assistance with his training. Yes we said!

Rye's team sport is Sitting Volleyball; a team game played as per volleyball rules but skating about a polished floor on your backside without wheelchair assistance. So Rye's request was for a polished floor approximately 5m x 10m and some "athletic types" to help retrieve the volleyball and set up 3 hours of training a week. What have I done?

We invited Rye to our July VVAA meeting for dinner and introduction to the club, where he spoke of his background and his ambitions; this endeared him to the members. We adopted Rye and presented him with a pocket money cheque for \$500

Luckily the polished floor was the easy bit. The rear pavilion of the Frankston RSL was just right. The VVAA club purchased a couple of extra volleyballs and the training sessions of 1 hour 3 days a week were set up.

The Frankston VVAA boys meet every Tuesday morning for coffee. Anything up to twenty vets come along. I made a request for "athletic types" to assist with ball re-

trieval duties to the group and was pleased by their enthusiasm to help, so a roster was drawn up..

A typical training session was to clear the pavilion of chairs and tables, rig up a make-shift net, mark out the court. Set Rye at one end and have two "retrievers" at the opposite end and another at Rye's end. Training started 17th July and ran through to 11th October; 27 sessions in all involving some 17 vets (now marginally fitter) and 3 partners.

Training would proceed with Rye practicing various parts of the game such as serving, spiking, slamming and setting up; all of which meant a whole lot of balls being wacked around the room, bouncing off walls, ceiling, windows and

air conditioners. It was then up to the "retrievers" to chase and gather the balls and return them to Rye to have the bombardment commence again. After an hour of this carry on, the ball chasers were glad to end and Rye had hardly cracked a sweat. We incurred only one broken window.

Apart from the training Rye is also selected in the wheelchair basketball team. I think we are all thankful that we were not required for that training cycle.

Rye is back to studying for a civil engineering degree and was the first person in Australia to complete the arduous Tough Mudder obstacle course in a wheelchair and has confirmed to many that with determination and commitment anyone can overcome

their obstacles.

13th October Rye left for Sydney and the Games and with ABC coverage we should see him in action on the 22nd.

On his return from the Games he has agreed to return to the club for a debrief of this his latest adventure. We all wish Rye the very best.

The next stage was the Weather Proofing and Painting so it would maintain its beauty for many years to come. This task was completed by Super Finish of Gaffney Street, Coburg. The Cross was Dedicated on the 2nd October 2018 by Padre Mark Dunn.

The project will be completed in early in 2019 with the last stage being the attachment of 4 Bronze plaques, Vietnam 1962-75, a Vietnam dedication, Lest we Forget and Vietnamese campaign Medals on the front, a plaque inscribed with the original wording on the Long Tan Cross will be mounted on the back.

The National Vietnam Veterans Museum is entering a very exciting time and, arguably, a new era. We have once again outgrown our existing facilities and to do justice to our constantly growing collection need to investigate expansion. The recent announcement by our Federal Member for Flinders, the Honourable Greg Hunt, to commit \$5 million to springboard fundraising efforts demonstrates a clear acknowledgement of the works we are doing are what we are endeavoring to achieve.

Museum Chairman of the Board, Kingsley Munday, Bob Elworthy and the General Manager met with Victorian State Minister for Tourism and Veterans Affairs, the Honourable John Eren, in May to outline expansion plans. Minister Eren verbalized his support for what we are endeavoring to accomplish and asked for further plans.

Bass Coast Shire is assisting us to identify alternate Phillip island sites for our new Museum.

Liberal Member for Bass, Brian Paynter, arranged a forum of eight (8) State Parliament Shadow Ministers on Phillip Island last August. Shadow Ministers were given an update of what we were trying to achieve. They were asked to support us and we wished them the best of luck in the upcoming State elections.

Visitor numbers to our Museum for the year to date have continued to increase.



The Victorian Tourism Industry Council (VTIC) recently advised that our Museum has received Australian Tourism Accreditation Program (ATAP) recognition. This enables use of the ATAP "tick" A good team effort.

TripAdvisor also advised that our Museum is a "**2018 Traveler's Choice Award**" winner in the following categories: - Top 25 Museums – South Pacific; Top 10 Museums – Australia.

Traveler's Choice Awards are the highest honour TripAdvisor can give – meaning our business is truly exceptional. Based on reviews and opinions from millions of travelers, we're in the top 1% of attractions.

TripAdvisor also saw fit to include our Museum in their "Hall of Fame" status as a result of obtaining the highest

visitor response rating for five consecutive years.

Volunteers Gail Wade, (Librarian) Marian Brennan (Collections) and the General Manager met with Museums Australia (Victoria) Museum Accreditation Program (MAP) Co-Managers last May. The purpose of the meeting was to review the MAP Coordinator's Report following our application for accreditation. Unfortunately, our application was unsuccessful however, a substantive amount of work has been devoted to the process and we're of the view that accreditation is not far away.

Victorian Police Compliance Enforcement, Licensing and Regulation Division representatives (3) visited our Museum in August, 2018 to inspect and log our weapon inventory. At the completion of their visitation positive comment was made and that a recommendation would be made to the Department of Justice recommending that the Minister provide our Museum with an Exemption under the Firearms Act in the name of the National Vietnam Veterans Museum Ltd.

The Museum is in the process of obtaining Centurion and Scorpion Tank Turret Simulators. Procurement procedures have been initiated. A chance meeting with Dr Clint Heinze, Department of Defence, may realize procurement of an F111 cockpit.

We are indeed fortunate to have a truly passionate group of eighty (80) Volunteers and less than three (3) Equivalent Full Time (EFT) Staff who devote a significant amount of their time and effort to our Museum. They go above and beyond. Without them we simply would not exist. Comprehensive volunteer training and induction programs have been developed and implemented. Most of them now online.

Our Museum was represented at the recent Victorian History Teacher's Association (VHTA) 2018 State Conference.

The "Caribou Classroom" was formally opened by Wing Commander Mike Ward in July, 2018. Commander Ward was the last pilot to fly Caribou 231.

Restoration Coordinator Colin Grey attended the RAN Historic Flight Disposal Centre last August in regard to procurement of a flying UH-1B Bell Iroquois helicopter. There are three accredited/recognized Australian Heritage Organizations seeking two "Hueys". The decision as to who the successful tenderer/tenderers will be is to be determined by a review board with the final decision taken by Chief of Navy. We are optimistic.

Our Museum hosted a small Vietnam Veterans Day service on Saturday 18th August. Commodore Greg Yorke, Chief of Navy, Senior Naval Officer, Victoria, spoke briefly before participating in a march and service at the Phillip Island RSL. Around 150 people attended.

The number of "Friends of The Museum" continues to grow.

We have recently procured a Kiowa helicopter and restoration has commenced. Restoration also continues on the Canberra bomber.

It is worth noting that recent vandalism and damage to many of the panels has been repaired.
